## Q&A - January meeting

### Password Manager Backup

Save a copy of the data file on a UFD (USB Flash Drive) or a second UFD.

Print a hard copy.

Print to a PDF file which can be Password protected.

### Spread Sheet Won't Print

All else works fine, except for outputs.

### Won't Print Preview or Export to PDF.

Make a copy of an OK file. Delete the data and save it.

Open the faulty file and using the key board Select All (Ctrl + A), Copy (Ctrl C).

Open the OK file and Paste (Ctrl V) the data into the new file and the Save (Ctrl S).

Then check to see if Print Preview will work.

### TV Subtitles

Because of poor quality sound, either poor speech or excessively loud background noise/sound, it is becoming necessary to use the subtitle (STTL) feature.

One problem is a similar sounding, but incorrect, word is displayed because the speech/sound is causing the Speech to Text software difficulty and it is doubtful if the output has been proofed.

### Firefox Chat Box

The Firefox Help Site only has a reference to a AntiVirus Chat Box which will not go away.

## **YOUR COMPUTER IS GETTING AN "ASSISTANT" WHETHER YOU ASKED FOR ONE OR NOT**

### **WINDOWS PCS**

Microsoft is busy rebuilding **Windows 11** around AI. The Copilot assistant is becoming the main way they want you to interact with your PC. New "AI PCs" have special chips called NPUs (Neural Processing Units) that let the computer run AI features right on the device. What that means for you:

You'll be able to:

- Ask your PC (in everyday language) to find files, summarize documents, or rewrite something you're typing.
- Get writing help in Word, Outlook, and other Microsoft 365 apps, including some features that work even if the internet is down on newer machines.
- The system will be more "context aware," meaning it can see what's on your screen and offer help based on that.

In other words, your PC will start acting more like a chatty assistant and less like a big filing cabinet.

## **Fixing Wi-Fi Connection Problems Easily on Windows 11 By Dellenny • by John Edward**

Did it happen to you that while watching a movie or trying to join a meeting, or playing game online then you find Wi-Fi is not working.

Although Windows 11 brings a modern look and better performance but still Wi-Fi issues can happen at any time. The good news is that most problems are easy to fix with a few simple steps.

In this blog will show you easy troubleshooting methods to fix your Wi-Fi connection issues on Windows 11 whether your device isn't detecting Wi-Fi or the connection drops frequently, or you can't get online at all.

Common Wi-Fi Problems on Windows 11  
You might experience one or more of the following:

- Wi-Fi not showing in settings
- Wireless adapter missing or disabled  
Connected, but no internet access
- Slow or unstable Wi-Fi
- Wi-Fi keeps disconnecting
- Error connecting to a network
- Can't connect after an update

Each of these issues has different causes—but the solutions below will help fix them in most cases.

**Quick Basic Fixes You Should Try First**  
Before diving into advanced fixes, try these simple steps:

### **Restart Your PC & Router**

- Many network glitches are temporary.
- Turn off your PC
- Unplug your router for 30 seconds
- Plug it back in and wait until all lights stabilize
- Restart your PC

This refreshes the network settings and often solves the problem instantly.

### Toggle Airplane Mode

A quick reset of wireless services:

1. Click Network icon in System Tray
2. Turn Airplane mode ON
3. Wait 10 seconds, turn it OFF

### Check Wi-Fi is Enabled

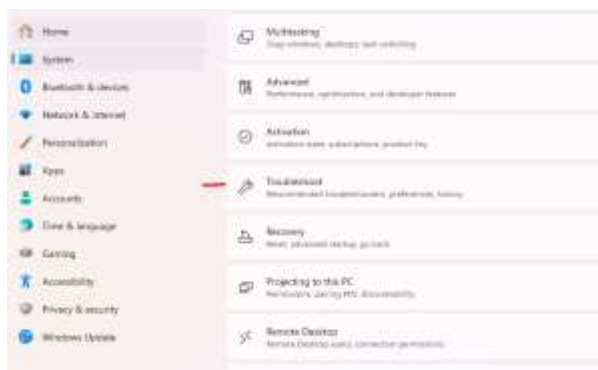
Go to:

Settings → Network & Internet → Wi-Fi → Toggle ON

If the Wi-Fi option is completely missing, it may be a driver issue. Keep reading!

### Step-by-Step Solutions for Wi-Fi Not Working in

Run the Network Troubleshooter Windows 11 includes a built-in tool that can automatically fix many problems.



1. Open **Settings**
2. Go to **System** → **Troubleshoot** → **Other troubleshooters**
3. Click **Run** next to **Network and Internet**  
Follow the prompts and apply any fixes suggested.

### Reinstall or Update Wi-Fi Adapter Driver

Driver issues are a common cause of missing or unstable Wi-Fi.

1. Press **Windows + X**
2. Click **Device Manager**
3. Expand **Network adapters**
4. Right-click your Wi-Fi adapter Choose

**Update driver** → *Search automatically* If still not working → choose **Uninstall device**

5. Restart your PC

Windows will reinstall the correct driver automatically.

### Reset Network Settings

This restores everything to default and helps fix deep connectivity errors.

Go to:

**Settings** → **Network & Internet** → **Advanced network settings** → **Network reset** → **Reset now**

Your PC will restart. You will need to reconnect to Wi-Fi afterward.

### Forget and Reconnect to the Wi-Fi Network

Sometimes stored passwords or configuration cause conflicts.

1. **Settings** → **Network & Internet** → **Wi-Fi** → **Manage known networks**
2. Select the network → **Forget**
3. Reconnect by entering the password again

### Turn Off VPN or Proxy (If Enabled)

VPNs and proxies can block Wi-Fi internet access.

- Disable any **VPN software**
- Go to **Settings** → **Network & Internet** → **Proxy** and turn off **Automatically detect settings** if needed

### Disable Power-Saving Features for Wi-Fi Adapter

Windows may turn off Wi-Fi to save power, especially on laptops.

1. **Device Manager** → **Network adapters**
2. Right-click Wi-Fi adapter → **Properties**
3. Go to **Power Management** tab
4. Uncheck: *Allow the computer to turn off this device to save power*

### Reset TCP/IP and DNS (Command Fix)

If you're connected but no internet access:

1. Open **Command Prompt** as **Administrator**
2. Run these commands one by one:  
netsh winsock reset  
netsh int ip reset

```
ipconfig /flushdns  
ipconfig /release  
ipconfig /renew  
Restart once done.
```

### Wi-Fi Still Slow? Try These Tips

If your Wi-Fi works but is slow or keeps dropping:

- Move closer to the router
- Reduce connected devices on the same network
- Switch between **2.4 GHz** and **5 GHz** bands
- Restart your router more often
- Update router firmware (check brand website)

### Advanced Fix: Check Windows Update

Buggy Windows updates occasionally break Wi-Fi. Install latest patches:

**Settings** → **Windows Update** → **Check for updates**

If the problem started **after** an update, consider uninstalling it temporarily.

### When to Contact Your Internet Provider

After trying all solutions, if another device also cannot get stable Wi-Fi, the issue might not be your PC.

Contact your ISP if:

- You see constant outages
- Router lights show connection failure
- Speed is much lower than your plan
- All devices lose connection randomly

Your provider may reset your service or replace faulty equipment.

Fixing Wi-Fi problems on Windows 11 doesn't have to be stressful. With the right steps like updating drivers, restarting the router, or resetting network settings you can quickly restore fast, stable internet access. Technology isn't perfect but knowing how to troubleshoot Wi-Fi issues yourself saves time and frustration. Keep this guide handy for the next time your connection drops!

### Renaming Multiple Files

Renaming one file in Windows is simple; just

click on the file in File Explorer to highlight the name which can then be typed over or edited as desired.

But, what if there are 12 files (or 1200), with names like 20241019\_103224.jpg, that need to be renamed in a logical sequence? Sure, you could edit them one-by-one but a much more efficient method is to use a purpose-built utility program that can apply a naming template to all the slides automatically.

Enter Advanced Renamer, a single-minded program from software developer Kim Jensen, that makes renaming multiple files a breeze.

When downloaded and installed, running the program displays a main screen that initially may seem a little daunting.

However, the first topic in the online user guide is *Getting Started* and this provides sim-plea, clear instructions, together with an annotated screenshot, of the four-step process to batch rename a group of files.

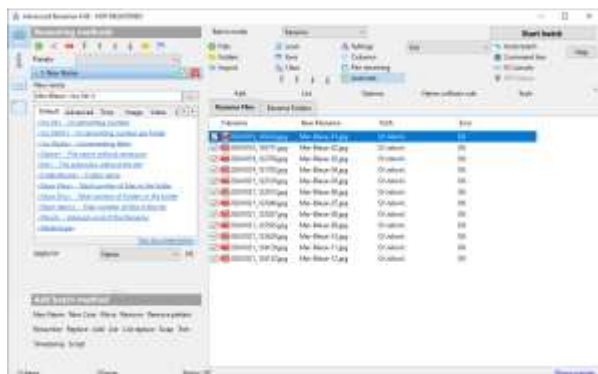
Firstly, the files to be renamed can be selected by clicking on the *Green plus sign/File* menu item under (*Continued from page 12*) (*Continued*)

**Batch Mode.** This loads a standard file-browse window where multiple files can be selected for pro-cessing.

Next, selecting *New name* from the *Add batch method* area on the lower-left side of the window provides a text box where a template for the new file name can be developed. Text can be typed into this box and supplemented by any of a number of pre-defined entries. For example, one commonly-used construct is to add the entry *<Inc Nr> - Incrementing number* in order to include sequence numbers in the file names.

In the example shown in Figure 1, the initial file name, 20241019\_103224.jpg, has been renamed to Mer-Bleue-01.jpg and this format has been automatically applied to the remaining files that have been selected for renaming.

The third, very useful, step is to review the set of new file names that are now displayed in the main pro-gram window. The template can be adjusted should the previewed results not be precisely those desired.

Finally, the *Start batch* control button is pressed to initiate the renaming process.

As its name suggests, Advanced Renamer has many more complex features, including the ability to change the case of text, use date and time information, conduct partial naming using search patterns, use music file tags and digital image metadata, and copying or moving files and folders.

These advanced options provide a range of exceptionally flexible file and folder renaming constructs.

The program is available for Windows (64-bit only) and Mac computers. The User Guide is very comprehensive with clear descriptions of the available features together with a number of useful examples. And, while the program's interface may initially seem somewhat complex, it is actually very easy to perform a simple batch file renaming process for a specific group of files which is the most likely requirement for the majority of users.
